On the 7-8th of September Miss Bradbury (Y4 teacher) completed the South Coast Ultra Challenge where she walked 100km over two days to raise money for Cancer Research UK. So far she has raised £800 for her chosen charity but any further donations would be greatly appreciated. The 2 Day Full 100km Challenge broke down the route into two halves of 57km on Day 1 and then 43km on Day 2. The walk started in Polegate where Miss Bradbury walked over the Seven Sisters, onto Cuckmere Haven, and over the South Downs all the way to Hove and continuing on to finish in Arundel. <u>Guide to Reading at home: Help Your Child Progress</u> Read for 10 to 30 minutes a day with your child for excellent results! Daily reading at home is important for building reading skills and becoming really fluent.

Nursery and YR

The early years are really important and a time when there is a lot of brain growth and tremendous levels of learning going on constantly. Children will be learning that books carry meaning and can be fun to look at and to listen to. Tips:

- Read lots of simple books over and over again.
- Miss out key phrases and rhyming words which your child will come to know.
- Let them learn some of the words with you and make up actions and acting out (Going on a Bear Hunt is good for this)

Books to read over and over again until they know them: We're Going on a bear Hunt, Where the Wild Things Are, Farmer Duck, The Gruffalo (all those Julia Donaldson books), Dinosaur Roar and similar texts. Teachers can provide more book ideas if needed.

Once children understand what books are all about and they have started to write their own name and notice that letters create words, then start to include phonics to try a few words out as you read e.g. 'dog', 'cat' etc- words they could spell out with you. Ask your child's teacher for the letter sounds chart and go over it each day, sounding out the letter sounds together.

Some children may progress now to the next level, others may need longer with the early sharing stage. **KS1**

As children learn more phonic skills they will start to blend and decode and build their knowledge of words and words in sentences carrying meaning. Children still need to share books and to join in with you when you read with them. Looking for rhyme and rhythm in a story is really key to learning. Point out key features like '?' and '!'. Talk about the layout of the book and how the pictures help with the story. Choose books with simple sentences which you can read to your child then let them have a go. Aim for success with every sentence. It isn't a test! Let them read aloud with you and just keep going if they struggle. "Let's have another run up" is better then "No, you got that wrong!" We all need encouragement and attention when learning to read. Everyone put phones away and turn the TV off please for reading time! Five minutes of total attention is better than 20 minutes trying to read and focus with too much noise and distraction. Just give harder words, don't let them struggle when they don't have a clue with a new word.

You could make some word cards for commonly used words to learn by heart e.g. because, when, you, are etc. Start to ask if they remember what happened in the story yesterday. Start to ask questions about what might happen next.

Move on to the next phase when ready. Children all learn to read at different rates.

Y3/4

It is really important that children continue to read daily at home during Y3 and Y4. Please ensure there is time for this at home. Children can add their own comments to their reading record but please also initial the book as the parent/carer and sit and listen regularly. As children enter KS2 they are usually but not always able to read more independently. If they are not ready, then go through the steps described so far. Sharing a book is still vital in terms of modelling reading skills. We pick up expression and emphasis from listening to others. Everyone put phones away and turn the TV off please for reading time! Five minutes of total attention is better than 20 minutes trying to read and focus with too much noise and distraction. Just give harder words, don't let them struggle when they don't have a clue with a new word. Children in Y3/4 should mostly be reading short novels and some may progress further. Children may be stilted in their reading style and slow to spell out new words. Some tips:

- Improve sounding out by doing it with themdragging the sounds from one letter to the next to make meaning.
- Look at the pictures for clues for meaning.
- Look at the whole sentence- what might the word say?
- Look at the word before and after- any clues?
- Spell out the word looking for any aspects which might help e.g. words within words like be in because or two words stuck together into. Use your phonic skills e.g. 'ch', 'th' (combine where you can). Be word detectives!
- Read a page each, take sentence turns. Give words quickly if they are obviously too hard. Keep the flow and rhythm without losing the meaning.

If children struggle too much to read and understand the meaning they are reading a book which is too hard. A child needs to be 90% accurate to read a book. Teachers help with book selection in class and do ask if help is needed for home reading ideas.

Y5/6

It is really important that children continue to read daily at home during Y5 and Y6. Losing the habit of reading can really stall learning progress. Please ensure there is time for this at home. Children can add their own comments to their reading record but please also initial the book as the parent/carer and sit and listen regularly. At this stage children should be reading fluently and able to talk about their favourite authors and styles of writing. If this is not the case then look at the stages leading up to this. It is ok to be behind where you should be but don't hang about and get started! It is so important to be reading well ready for Y7. Every subject demands swift and good reading skills. Being a good reader is important in life.

Everyone put phones away and turn the TV off please for reading time! Five minutes of total attention is better than 20 minutes trying to read and focus with too much noise and distraction. Just give harder words, don't let them struggle when they don't have a clue with a new word.

Continue to read aloud with your child, taking turns so they hear a good reading model and talk about the plot ,the humour, the author's style and about the meaning of new words. Ask class teachers if you need any help with reading at home.
